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
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Section 1: The Costed Vision

Our vision is to make Clarksfield, Littlemoor and Greenacres a better place to live and enable positive change



Spending priorities identified by the Big Local Oldham Partnership Board (the Board) from resident feedback collected via an online survey and face to face engagement with groups include:

- Alleyway improvements in Clarksfield
- Investment in parks in Clarksfield, Greenacres and Littlemoor
- · Activities for young people, with a focus on secondary school age
- Activities for older and socially isolated residents
- More community engagement activities
- Addressing issues of fly tipping and street cleaning
- Providing advice services to address concerns around rent and housing, benefits, unemployment and financial support
- Food support
- Investment and infrastructure support for groups and individuals
- Access to fitness and exercise
- Covid Recovery Fund for groups and individuals
- Working with partners to develop shared spaces, such as Clarksfield Academy

- Training opportunities for the community FA Coaching

- Young people's partnership

Section 2: Big Local Oldham Action Plan

When will the plan start and end?

Building upon the achievements of our previous plan, this plan will start on 1 February 2021 and end on 31 January 2024. It has been created by the Board in consultation with residents and partners across the three Big Local Oldham (BLO) areas - Clarksfield, Littlemoor and Greenacres

About our Partnership



What principles and criteria guide our work?

Our vision for Clarksfield, Littlemoor and Greenacres continues to develop from the Vision and Priorities set out in Appendix 1. In this plan we intend to build on our achievements so far. Highlights of our successes include:

Public Space Development

- Arundel Street Park Regeneration this area is well used by the local
 community and has been an outdoor
 asset, used for events, activities and
 particularly important during the
 coronavirus pandemic.
- Started work on development Beresford Street park, making it a safer space to walk and play





Activities across the areas

• Regular programme of activities and groups taking place across the areas



- Activities becoming more sustainable;
 Friday Brunch (NEON Hub is now volunteer led
- Groups that were supported by Oldham Big Local funding continue to run: Knit and Chat, Boxing Club, Football Training



Regeneration Projects Alleyways across Clarksfield; well used and really important safe spaces for families. We have had lots of feedback from residents who have ideas for their alleyways.

• Veg in the Park complete new cabin installation complete - partially supported by BLO. Used for activities, events, members and other groups including the Incredible Plastic Street Band.

Covid 19 Pandemic Response

- Supported Oldham Foodbank throughout the initial lockdown period
- Created online engagement opportunities through a weekly zoom catch up
- Shared vital information through social media and engagement visits
- Distributed family wellbeing packs during the summer and Christmas holidays
- Created online activities including an engagement survey and competition for young people
- Provided masks and hand sanitiser supplies to groups and individuals



Positive Partnerships

- Worked closely with local schools
- Provided funding to local groups as part of our Treasure Chest grants supporting, a new creative English project, a football training group and

a digital skills enterprise

- Worked with Oldham libraries to support residents to get online
- Worked closely with Oldham Foodbank
- Involved in wider projects such as the new Leesbrook Academy's Heritage Trail



Skills and Training

- Board members have developed skills and confidence to make decisions
- Workshop and training opportunities made available to the Board and residents



 Trained and supported residents with new skills such as First Aid, Food Hygiene and FA Football coaching


About our area

BLO serves the areas of Littlemoor, Greenacres and Clarksfield. The three districts are each quite distinct.

Littlemoor is mainly comprised of a former council estate, now run by the housing association, First Choice Homes Oldham (FCHO). Much of the housing consists of small flats and maisonettes. Consequently, there is a high concentration of single and older people, and social isolation is a problem. The population is also relatively transient. Its assets include a green environment, a children's centre and a park, part of which is a growing hub - Veg in the Park.

Greenacres is quite mixed. A former council estate, now managed by FCHO, it consists mainly of family homes with gardens. The rest is mainly Victorian terraced housing. Its assets include 2 community centres, (Greenacres and NEON Hub) and some open spaces, including two play areas catering for young children and teens. One of these play areas is in the process of being upgraded and developed with BLO funding.

Clarksfield is overwhelmingly terraced housing with little greenery. It has gated backings which are mainly in a poor state but are potentially a rich asset, both for safe play space and for social mixing in this ethnically diverse area. It also has a park which was recently upgraded and re equipped with BLO funding.



Following our last Community Plan there have been many changes and challenges affecting the area and the wider region. The Coronavirus pandemic has had a significant impact on our areas with people facing isolation, mental health issues, changes to income and other hardships as a result of the pandemic. During this time the Board invited residents to share their experiences as part of an online survey, key challenges included:

- A lot of people needing help financially
- Increased social isolation and loneliness
- Increased demand for advice, support and food
- A lot more people out of work
- Fly tipping has increased
- Lack of activities has had an adverse impact on mental and physical health
- Increased help needed for vulnerable families, single parents, older people
- More support is needed for residents' fitness, and more recreational areas for residents to enjoy
- Further inequality

As the Coronavirus pandemic put our usual activities on hold, the Board created a plan to support residents in new and refocused ways:

- Donating our Development Worker's time to support Oldham Foodbank with satellite Foodbank provision in our community (alongside Neon Hub) and to support the combined Oldham wide Foodbank
- Creating online engagement opportunities including a weekly online chat, community quizzes, online competition and signposting support via social media
- Delivering Family Wellbeing packs to residents through Food Pantries and Schools in the area at the start of the Summer Holiday period, including information of support services available for families in the area
- Getting involved in local Covid-19 doorstep engagement alongside Oldham Council and Action Together

Our LTO

A Locally Trusted Organisation (LTO) is the organisation chosen by OBL partnership to administer and account for the distribution of funds and employ staff on behalf of the BLO partnership. This is necessary because BLO doesn't exist as a legal entity and cannot receive, administer and account for funding. This is why The Local Trust asks partnerships to work with organisations which they trust, that have the appropriate skills and structures in place to undertake these activities on the partnership's behalf.

The BLO partnership, for the following plan years has agreed for its LTO to be Action Together CIO. BLO are pleased to have secured the services of Action Together again to assist in making the BLO area a better place for all residents. With Action Together's vast experience in strengthening communities and working with community and voluntary groups in supporting them achieve their goals, we believe we as a partnership can achieve more in our final years of our plan with this LTO. By learning together, sharing skills and pooling resources we can hopefully get more done.

How do we know that this is what our community wants?

In October 2019, the Oldham Big Local Partnership Board appointed a Development Worker, Ella Walker, to help develop further engagement and reach across our three areas.

Ella has made connections with organisations and groups across the area, as well as other professional and statutory partners from the wider Oldham Borough, to broaden our understanding of the aims and experiences of the residents.

To help us develop this Plan, the Board were keen to create new opportunities to reach and communicate with residents. Ella planned a series of community consultation events and activities including regular coffee and cake events, engagement sessions with existing groups and the development of fitness classes and lifelong learning intro sessions to engage more people to connect with Big Local Oldham.

Unfortunately, the Covid-19 pandemic put a stop to the majority of these plans but thinking creatively, we got information out to people and have been able to gather some fantastic knowledge from our residents. The information is set out in more detail in Appendix 2.

The Board have learned to focus on delivering what is in their control to achieve - they cannot deliver everything and cannot replace the roles of other partners such as the Council. Strong partnerships have formed and are extremely valued and will continue to ensure the legacy of the work of Big Local Oldham going forward.

Sustainability


By developing lasting partnerships and networks for people we will continue to work hard to make sure the good changes we have made will have a lasting legacy, beyond the 10 years of Big Local.

Appendix 3

What have we learned - extract from 2018-2020 Plan Review

2018-20 Plan Review - What have we learnt?

To understand what we have learnt across the 2018-20 plan the partnership group completed an individual questionnaire (Appendix E: Individual Involvement Survey) exploring what they have learnt and experienced as members of the Partnership Group which was then discussed within the group at the second planning workshop held on Mon 2 March 2020.

What have we learnt?

- There is no magic wand (to 'fix' things with)
- To be more tolerant / not judgemental to others
- Residents should be at heart of BLO and able to lead activities
- £1million is lots of money, but also no money (when looking at everything that is needed in the community)
- It can be hard to engage with residents as residents, other residents have more and different challenges
- Learnt that BLO has limitations we cannot do everything
- Collaborative working works coming together can help us achieve more

What do we need to learn?

- How to further engage with residents in Littlemoor (where we have experienced less engagement so far)
- When to draw the line / move on from a project:
 - Specific projects rather than whole areas
 - Try different approaches
- How to communicate that you do not have to join Board to make a change
 - Other ways for residents to be involved
- How to ask the right questions, get at root of problems not just straight to solution

What do we wish we had known at the beginning?

- Wish current Board were in existence at beginning (focus on resident members)
- Resident led = residents' money
- Quality of residents' decisions not questioned it is OK to learn
- Go for it you can learn from things that do not go according to what you might have planned
